Hinged Bible Study: Ephesians

Week 5 Ephesians 3:1-13

The beginning of chapter 3 is the "hinge" between the end of chapter two (the breakdown of the dividing wall of hostility between Jews and Gentiles) and Paul's intercessory prayer for the Ephesians which begins in verse 14 of chapter

3. Paul goes on to explain the mystery of the gospel of Christ: that Jews and Gentiles are joint heirs in the promises of God, and it's all because of GRACE.

So what does this mean now for us, when we don't necessarily have Jew and Gentile? Well, look at other possible dividing walls...country life vs city life; homeschooled vs public schooled; family background; "grow up" in the church vs first generation believer; ethnicity; various life situations...on and on. These things can all creep in and cause division between the body of believers. We ask God to give us eyes to see the beauty of His glorious redemption, and how vast and wide it truly is.
